I. Personal Salvation

A. Need of the Savior

The student will

- 1. Define sin
- 2. Discover personal sinfulness
- 3. Determine personal need for the Savior

B. Provision of the Savior

The student will

- 1. Identify Jesus as the Savior
- 2. Determine that Jesus is the only Savior

C. Acceptance of the Savior

The student will

- 1. Believe in the Lord Jesus as personal Savior.
- 2. Accept Jesus as my Savior.

II. Biblical Apologetics (explain & defend)

A. Doctrine of God

The student will

- 1. Recognize the existence of God
- 2. Recall that God is a Spirit and is eternal
- 3. Identify God as ominipotent, omniscient, omnipresent, immutable, faithful, holy, righteous, merciful and love
- 4. Show the existence of God in nature and in the Bible
- 5. Discover the uniqueness of God as the eternal Spirit
- 6. use Scruipture to prove that God is omnipotent, omniscient, omnipresent, immutable, faithful, holy, righteous, merciful, and love
- 7. Explain the functions of each person in the Trintiy
- 8. Differentiate between God's eternal Spirit and the rest of the universe (creation)
- 9. Analyae God's actions based on His attributes
- 10. Relate the function of each person in the Trinity to salvation and Christian living

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B. Doctrine of the Bible

The student will

- 1. Tell that the Bible is the complete, inerrant Word of God
- 2. Discover the proofs of inspiration
- 3. Defend the Bible as the authoritative Word of God

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C. Doctrine of Man

The student will

- 1. State that God directly created perfect man in His image for His glory
- 2. Recall the fall of man and his need for redemption
- 3. Describe the final state of the unredeemed and the redeemed
- 4. Explain the results fo the first sin: spiritual death, physical punishment, lost communion with God
- 5. Differentiate between man's state without Christ and his state in Christ

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D. Doctrine of Salvation

The student will

- 1. identify Christ as both God and perfect man.
- 1. tell that Christ died for man and rose again
- 1. state that man must receive salvation in order to have eternal life and a personal relationship with his creator
- 1. recall the meaning of the terms incarnation, atonement, regeneration, justification, and sanctification
- 2. show from Scripture that Christ was both God and perfect man
- 2. explain the how salvation gives eternal life and a personal relationship with God
- 2. develop an understanding of the terms incarnation, atonement, regeneration, justification, and sanctification
- 3. scripturally support the concepts of incarnation, atonement, regeneration, iustification, and sanctification
- 3. specify the importance of incarnation, atonement, regeneration, justification, and sanctification


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E. Doctrine of the Church

- 7. Fix value to living as Jesus Christ's representative

A. "Loving your God." Mark 12:30

The students will

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VI. Christian Service

A. Home

The students will

1. show evidence in daily living of having accepted Jesus Christ as Savior.

2. put into action the Scriptural principles of obedience to parents/guardians.

3. relate to family memers with unconditional love.



B. Church

The students will

- 1. accept God's mandate to faithfully attend church to worship God and fellowship with fellow believers.
- 2. employ a plan to give time, talents, and money for the glory of God.
- 3. pursue ways to serve and benefit others through local church ministries.

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C. Community/School

The students will

- 1. find ways to participate in activities that render attention to godly living.
- 2. make use of existing programs to promote christian involvement.
- 3. promote or support Christian/moral candidates in the political sphere.

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D. Country

The students will

- 1. demonstrate allegiance to God and country.
- 2. exercise a Christian voice, through involvement in local/national organizations (i.e. National Day of Prayer, Right to Life, AFA, CWA, See You at the Pole).
- 3. vote in local and national elections.

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E. World

The students will

- 1. participate in the global need for spreading the Gospel message.
- 2. devise a personal plan to pray and give to missions.
- 3. surrender personally to go to the mission field, if God directs.

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
